Idols of the Heart

Idolatry is one of the most abhorrent sins to God. In one way, this sin is more serious than murder, adultery or any other sin humanity is guilty of. Why? Because idolatry, at its core, is the sin of disbelief by which something else – and idol – overtakes the throne deep inside the heart where Christ alone is to be the Lord and King. Jesus said, "I tell you, every sin and blasphemy will be forgiven people, but the blasphemy against the Spirit will not be forgiven." God is offended by our willingness to compromise His exclusive place of residence thus offering Him a status of a roommate to other entities happily enthroned in the heart.

In the Book of Exodus, six chapters are devoted to God's judgment of the Egyptian's idolatry. God sent ten progressively devastating plagues. His intent, however, was not just to punish the Egyptian slave masters, it was also to rescue His own people from the oppression of these idols they served. God saw that His people had become just as corrupt as the Egyptians. The culture of the enemy has infiltrated God's camp. The same thing can happen to believers today – that's why we must study Exodus carefully and learn from steps God's people took in the past.

The ten plagues represent the totality of the corruption. As a counterpart, God gave His people the Ten Commandments, representing the totality of God's moral law. And yet, do you remember what happened? Just as soon as they received the holy commandments, they made an idol, a golden calf, and worshipped it, so deep was the enemy's culture engrained in them. Yet, the loving Father kept chasing them, as Nehemiah recalls, "Even when they had made for themselves a golden calf and said, 'This is your God who brought you up out of Egypt,' and had committed great blasphemies, you in your great mercies did not forsake them" (Nehemiah 9:18-19).

Here is the thing about idols: they are not just the usurpers of God's glory, but also have a profound influence on our spiritual foundation. Jesus died for our sins so that we can be remade in the image of God through Him. Satan, however, uses idolatry to shape a person into the image of the idol. The Word of God says, "The idols of the nations are silver and gold, the work of human hands. They have mouths, but do not speak; they have eyes, but do not see; they have ears, but do not hear, nor is there any breath in their mouths. Those who make them become like them and so do all who trust in them." (Psalm 135:15–18).

Every culture has its idols. I guess modern-day Protestants don't bow down to or worship images made by human hands, but through an honest heart check, we may find all kinds of idols creeping in or already enthroned and usurping God's sovereignty within. Have you ever met any Christians plagued by the idol of prosperity, materialism, selfishness, false doctrine or piety? Unfortunately, there are plenty of those around. Sadly, the church often tolerates this form of evil for fear of losing their members.

Let's dig deeper and use this study to cleanse the throne of Christ within our hearts of any undesired competition. The Lord did not give up on the Israelites, how much more will He not give up on those who confess Christ.

They'll Know We Are Christians by Our...

Happy February! Can you believe it's February already? I don't know about you, but I think it's absolutely hilarious that not even 2-3 days after Christmas, Wal-Mart and Target start putting out decorations and trinkets for the next big commercialized holiday – you guessed it: Valentine's Day! Isn't it interesting how the way God defines love is so different than our culture? In our culture, love is often interchangeable with happiness – whether it's romantic relationships or friendships, loving someone should make you happy. Let's look at what God says about the real meaning of love:

Love is patient and kind; love does not envy or boast; it is not arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice at wrongdoing, but rejoices with the truth. Love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never ends. As for prophecies, they will pass away; as for tongues, they will cease; as for knowledge, it will pass away.

1 Corinthians 13:4-8

Do you see happiness mentioned anywhere in that passage? I don't! I'll be honest though, sometimes I wish it did! It would be nice if loving our children, spouses, and friends always made us happy, but we know that's not true. According to God's definition of love, love is patient. It is kind. It's not resentful or bitter. It endures all things. It's sacrificial.

I don't know about you, but sometimes doing those things doesn't make me happy! Being patient with my kids when they spill syrup on the floor for the 18th time doesn't necessarily make me happy. Being kind to a grumpy neighbor doesn't make me happy. To the left of this passage, I mention shoveling the drive-way for a neighbor. That doesn't always make me happy; it makes me sweaty and tired!

So why does God define love this way? Because no matter who God has called us to love, real, lasting, God-honoring love reflects the work Christ did on the cross. When we mirror to those around us how Christ loved us, we no longer settle for temporary and fleeting happiness. Rather, we emulate enduring love that, instead of pointing to our own selfish desires, points to the eternal love portrayed through Christ's death and resurrection. On the cross and in His ministry on earth, Jesus was patient, kind, humble, and truthful. When we mirror this to our friends, children, spouses, and coworkers, we mirror the ministry of Jesus. And in doing so, we allow Christ the opportunity to transform our relationships to be deeper and more glorifying to Him.

If you're struggling in a relationship with a friend, co-worker, spouse, or anyone, consider examining the root of what you're seeking in that relationship. Is it your happiness? Or is it rather the opportunity to reflect Jesus to that person by loving them the way Christ loved you? In no way does this make loving that person easier, but perhaps it might refocus our attention not on ourselves, that person, or the difficult or hurtful things they do, but rather on our God, our creator, and our Father who has perfectly loved us.





How is Biblical Soul Care Different from Other Counseling?

There are 3 general forms of counseling: Traditional (Secular) Psychology Counsel, Integrated Counseling, and Biblical Counseling.

Traditional Psychology bases counsel from over 200 different teachings such as Freudian Psychoanalysis, Skinner's Behavioral Modification, Rogerian Reflection, Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs, etc. Sometimes a combination of methods is used. It is important to note most of the founders of psychology were atheists who attempted to replace religion with human reason.

Psychology excels at observing human behavior but falls short in interpreting those behaviors and offering solutions because they turn to human reason for answers. Psychology can identify and describe common human patterns and responses, but the interpretation is influenced by non-Christian thought and the teaching of Evolution.

Integrated Counseling attempts to combine traditional psychology with Christian principals.

Biblical Counseling is founded in the belief that God is the Creator of all things and the solution to man's brokenness and how to live a full and abundant life is only found in His Word (2 Peter 1:3). A Biblical Counselor is dependent solely on the Word and the Power of the Holy Spirit.

At Harvest we embrace Biblical Soul Care (BSC) as an alternative to the world's view of counseling, a care anchored in God's Word, dependent on the Power of the Holy Spirit, and practiced in a community of faith. Biblical Soul Care addresses the problem of human suffering by teaching us to observe all that Jesus commanded (Matt 28:18-20), empowering us to glorify God in all circumstances (1 Peter 5:6-11), and assisting in the pursuit of the resemblance of Christ (2 Cor 3:18).
